Urban Agriculture and Innovative Production (UAIP) Grants



Urban Agriculture and Innovative Production Grants



Provide access to food in areas where it is limited or unavailable.



Proposals must be designed to support multiple farmers or gardeners



No partner match required.





UAIP Applicant Eligibility

- Nonprofit organizations with or without 503(c)(3) status
- Unit of local governments
- Special districts
- Tribal governments
- Any school serving grades K-12



UAIP Project Activities

The UAIP provides support for planning and implementation activities. Below are some **example** of activities that can be funded:

UAIP Priorities

Special emphasis will be given to projects that:

- Anticipate or demonstrate economic benefits for the targeted community;
- Experience in agriculture or innovative production for 3 years or more or in serving historically underserved communities or where access to fresh foods is limited or unavailable;
- Demonstrated ability to implement a project, provide fiscal accountability, collect data, and prepare reports and other necessary documentation
- Collaboration with one or more partner organizations working in the project target area to carry out the innovative or urban agricultural work described in your proposal; and
- Demonstrated willingness to share information with researchers, evaluators, practitioners, and other interested parties, including a plan for dissemination of results.




UAIP Fact Sheet

OUAIP has awarded over \$48.4 million to 188 projects through UAIP since the program was inaugurated in 2020.

- FY20 \$3,022,171,10 Projects
- FY21 \$23,262,611, 95 Projects
- FY22 \$14,416,764, 52 Projects
- FY23 \$9,159,576, 31 Projects
- Popular: Applications for FY23 more than doubled compared from the previous year alone
- Demographics:
 - 86% of recipients are non-profits


CFWR Priorities

Priority will be given to pilot projects that:

- Show economic benefits in the community.
- Make compost more accessible to agricultural producers.
- Include food waste reduction strategies.
- Incorporate strategic partnerships.


- OUAIP has awarded over \$12.4 million to 81 projects through CFWR since the program was inaugurated in 2020.
 - FY20 \$1,094,862.48, 13 Projects
 - FY21 \$1,919,133.70, 24 Projects
 - FY22 \$9,178,695.25, 44 Projects
 - FY23 \$11,174,830.00, 38 Projects
- About 23% of projects directly incorporate food recovery efforts
- Popular: Applications for FY23 increased by 70% compared from the previous year alone
- Demographics:
 - 49% of our agreements are with localities that have less than 100,000 people
 - 35% are from localities with less than 50,000, often less than 10,000
